Veterans card/lapel pin/covenant officially launched



The long-awaited and much talked about Veteran Card, lapel pin and covenant were officially launched last Sunday and will soon be distributed to all DVA-registered veterans as a practical demonstration of respect and recognition for their service.

Minister for Veterans and Defence Personnel Darren Chester officially launched the Veteran Card, which gives Australian business owners the opportunity to practically demonstrate thanks and respect for those who have served Australia in military uniform.

"Australian Defence Force veterans will be able to access thousands of special discounts as businesses across the nation say 'thank you for your service'," Mr Chester said.

Prime Minister Scott Morrison said Australians had a great deal of respect for those who served our nation in the uniforms of the Navy, Army and Air Force and, through the Veteran Card, veterans would have access to more than 10,000 offers from around 500 businesses, both over the counter and online.

"Much like the lapel pin gives everyday Australians the opportunity to recognise veterans and thank them for their service, the offers available through the veteran card allow the business community to show its thanks," Mr Morrison said.

"The broader recognition package, which includes the Veterans Covenant, the lapel pin and card is a way each and every one of us, including the business community, can say to our veterans 'thank you for your service'."

More than 33,000 veterans and reservists have already applied and will begin receiving their covenant packs in coming days.

Mr Chester will launch the card at Pushys in Fyshwick this morning along with representatives from other participating businesses and Australian Partners of Defence – APOD – which is partnering with the Department of Veterans' Affairs to connect clients with the business community.

"Bringing corporate Australia on board will be a tangible benefit to the veteran community, with the card providing access to services and benefits for eligible veterans," Mr Chester said.

"We are proud to be partnering with APOD — an organisation founded and run by veteran families for veteran families — to ensure veterans can easily find local businesses in their area that are showing that respect and recognition of their service.

"There are a wide range of businesses already participating, from retailers with hundreds of outlets Australia-wide through to veteran-owned and operated small businesses [including CONTACT, which received more than 400 new subscribers in the first two days, via its APOD listing, which is 'TRENDING' on the APOD web site].

"There is no set criteria for how businesses choose to show that respect and recognition, but I have no doubt we will see the numbers grow with more businesses supporting the covenant and veterans and their families have made.

"I encourage all businesses to get on board with the Australian Defence Veterans' Covenant and show their respect and recognition for those who have served to defend our nation."



Bereavement payments Once DVA has been notified about the death of a pension recipient, depending on circumstances, bereavement payments may be payable. A bereavement payment is a one-off, non-taxable payment designed to help with the costs that may follow the death of a pensioner or member/former member. The bereavement payment available depends on whether the person's service is covered by the *Veterans' Entitlements Act 1986* (VEA) or the *Military Rehabilitation and Compensation Act 2004* (MRCA). There is no bereavement payment for those with service under the *Safety, Rehabilitation and Compensation (Defence-related Claims) Act 1988* (DRCA).

MEET A MEMBER



Scott Thureson Early Days: While I was still at school, my weekends and holidays were spent working with a plasterer. I also played Rugby League from the age of 7 for both club & school. My other sporting interest was swimming and I finished up training under Lawrence before joining the military.

From the age of 16, I tried several times to enlist in the Army but without success. In July 1995 I registered with the recruiting office in Brisbane and having completed all the necessary requirements in education, medical, physical & psychological I passed with flying colours. I was too late however for acceptance in the July intake, and in October of 1995 I was accepted by the army and bussed to the 1RTB Kapooka for 12 weeks basic training.

There were 2 platoons that completed this training and we were transferred to IET at Singleton School of Infantry. In March 1996 I was transferred to Townsville to the 1st Battalion. I spent the next 6 years with the 1st as a lead scout perfecting my skills and conducting a number of specialist qualifications.


In 1998 D Company was sent to Malaysia Rifle Company Butterworth for 4 1/2 months. In 2000/2001, The battalion was then deployed to Timor for 6 1/2 months. The first three months of this deployment I was registered in a Pioneer platoon conducting patrols in a number of local villages, boat patrols, and from borders to Dili. We also carried out construction and maintenance of bases, ranges, schools, and roads. The second half of my Timor experience I was promoted to L/Cpl and sent to A Company conducting border posts and patrolling from village to village maintaining security. We also conducted a number of covert observation posts to gather intelligence, and I was finally discharged in 2009.

I struggled for a number of years after discharge going from job to job in civilian life until I came across an army mate who I had trained, and he was working very successfully as a Rope Access Tech. The excitement of this job appealed to me and I began to gain skills in the Rope Access area. From 2010—2015 I worked with a real sense of fulfillment until my shoulder and back began to suffer and I was forced to resign.

I needed help with DVA claims that I was working through and found non acceptance in several Gold Coast sub branches. I was encouraged to go to Helensvale sub branch where I found people who understood and were prepared to help with the claims. When I finally moved to the Sunshine Coast area, I found an advocate at Cooroy Pomona Sub Branch who helped me further and it was a place where I felt accepted. I've always been encouraged and supported here and am looking for ways to give back, and assist other veterans.

Equine Therapy was an invaluable part of my ongoing well-being, and I am now committed to working with horses, as an owner/trainer in the racing industry.

If you are aware of any young veterans who are struggling in civilian life please let them know that there is always a listening ear and a shoulder to lean on at Cooroy Pomona RSL Sub Branch.










Thirtieth Anniversary of the Berlin Wall opening

At the November meeting Ian Whisker passed around pieces of the Berlin Wall he had collected on a visit to both West and East Berlin in November 1989. His visit was a week after the East German government announced the lowering of restrictions on movement through the wall, which heralded the removal of the Berlin wall the following year.

Ian spoke about the stark difference between the two sides of the wall and the difference in living conditions. He also spoke about the joy of East German families as they crossed into West Berlin on the Saturday morning, and looked with amazement at the range of goods available in West German shops. The West German government had given each family 100 Marks [about 180 US dollars] to spend in the shops that day.
